Awareness raising about act Village level Change maker group. Organized the study circle and organized the School Management Committee. Organized Cluster Clubs and change maker workshops. Organized Theatre, speech competition in Colleges university and schools for violence against women. Formation of Children Club and orientate them. Easy writing Competition, Quiz Competition and Posture Making. Mobilizing and engaged parents and teacher and wider communities. Awareness programs through radio airing. With 15 VOs established Listener's club, concluding/closing workshops for Listener's club (15 women and 15 men) and introduced an awareness program through 15 VOs in 5 UCs.

Disaster Management



525 rooms were constructed and equipped with sanitation facilities to improve hygiene and living conditions for flood-affected families. A total of 540 beneficiaries were trained in masonry skills, enabling them to rebuild and repair their homes and community infrastructure. Mock drill trainings were conducted in 21 schools to strengthen preparedness and resilience among students and teachers against natural disasters. Disaster Preparedness Manuals were developed and distributed among the target schools to enhance awareness and safety practices during emergencies. A Cluster-Level Training Centre was established where 100 households received training on flood preparedness to improve community-level disaster response. In addition, non-food items were distributed in the flooded areas of District Layyah to support affected families. Repair toolkits and dignity kits were also provided to flood-affected people to help them restore their homes and maintain personal hygiene with dignity.

Quality and Basic Education



In the first phase, ADO constructed a primary school building, and in the second phase, enrolled students. To date, the school has grown to 853 students, achieving outstanding results in District Layyah. Additionally, ADO's branch, TLS, has created permanent employment opportunities for 70 households. ADO established 50 BECS schools, achieving a 100% enrollment target of 25 students per school.

Electoral and Legislative

Conducted training sessions for election officials, including Presiding Officers (PROs), Senior Assistant Presiding Officers (Sr. APOs), Assistant Presiding Officers (APOs), and Polling Officers (POs). Provided refreshments during sessions, collected attendance across three divisions, and established facilitation camps for candidate document submission and election-day monitoring. To raise awareness campaigns for transparent electoral process.

Human Institutional Development and Campaigns

Formed COs, VO, and LSOs, built their capacities through trainings, identified CRPs, and organized melas, exposure visits, and linkages with line departments. Established AAWAZ Steering Committee and Advisory Council, conducted political economy analysis, baseline study, and piloted initiatives in seven districts on institutional development, capacity building, and advocacy. Delivered skills training under Hunar Sa Bahali Project and conducted carpet survey in flood-affected areas.

Formed 12 district-level water rights forums, publicized water distribution schedules in local newspapers reaching 30% of farmers, and conducted six farmer group trainings on oversight, enabling effective monitoring. Produced and distributed 12,000 IEC materials, aired eight radio messages reaching 3% of Layyah's population, and organized three seminars to sensitize farmers and government officials.

Water Efficient Program

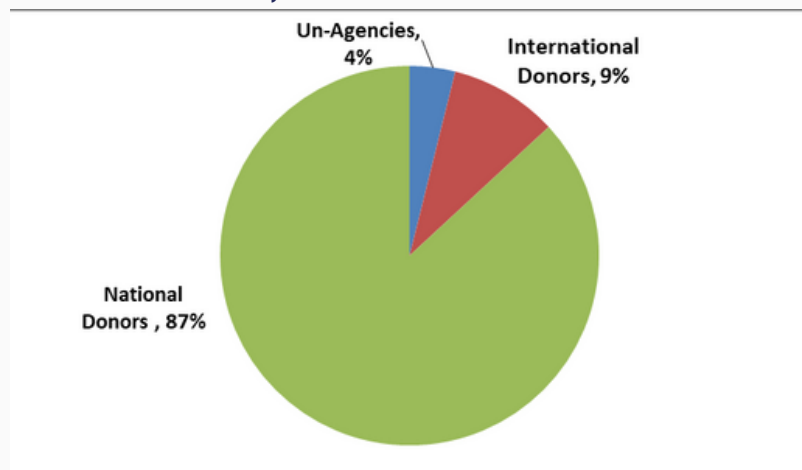
